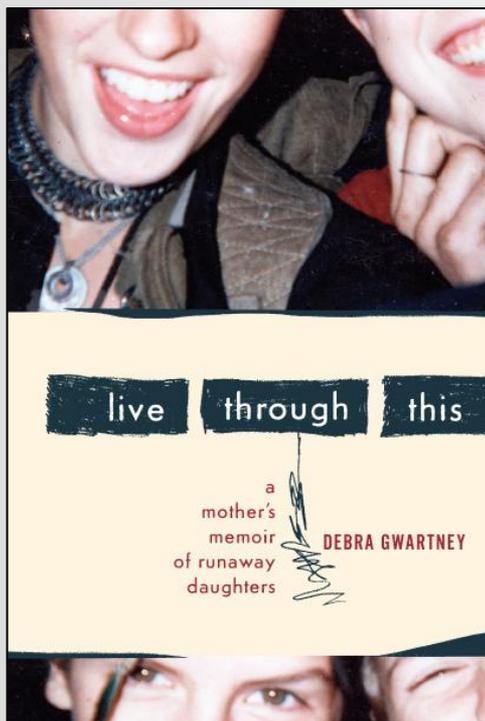

Even though it's been more than a decade since my children returned home from a yearlong bout as train-hopping runaways, even though the girls are healthy and thriving, I'll never forget the pain of our past. I didn't want to face the situation with my own children, but now I know we have reached a crisis point with young people who decide they'd rather live on violence- and drug-ravaged streets than stay at home with family tensions.

Through NRS research, I've become educated about the numbers of families embroiled in the runaway quandary (finally realizing that I was not alone in dealing with teenagers determined to run); I've come to understand the legislative initiatives the organization has supported to the betterment of every American family; and I have a better grasp of the tremendous solicitude that goes into NRS counselors' attempts (many of them successful) to bring parents and children back together again. I have been able to work through much of my grief about the years of difficulty in my family life in part because NRS has provided me, and thousands of others, with a broader view of a national challenge—their commitment to keep youth off the streets, away from the predators who are deft at luring young people into danger. NRS has, and will continue to, emphasize the profundity of an issue that permeates too many lives, and that needs attention, right now, from all of us.
